- Our Grand curtain and the Advertising curtain on the Grange hall stage has been stored to save them from the dirt during construction of the new windows, ceiling, insulation, and cleanup. They will then be taken out, restored, and properly hung again.
- The kitchen cabinets, walls, floor and ceiling look great!
- ◆ Jim Dimaio our Forester has walked the property borders marking them. One step closer.
- Brian, Tom, and Howard moved displays, stoves, and artifacts in the Civil War Room to make a better display, and more room to move around.
- The Grand Curtain and advertising curtain in the Grange hall are properly stored.
- Reserve the garden for your small event, a bridal shower, an intimate wedding, or a special tea party with friends.
- Invite your friends to our Saturday afternoon tea or just visit the building and tour the vast collection of artifacts.

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Saturday at the Building

May 7th will mark the first Saturday for the building to be open for the 2016 season. **Tom, Harry, and Jerry** will be hosting and you are invited to come on down and learn more about the collection and the building. A testament to the commitment of our volunteers to keep the museum open to the public to enjoy, along with our successful "Tuesday Night at the Museum" which runs from April to December allowing access from 6 to 8 pm. There have been an average of 8 people in the building every Tuesday night, let's create an equally successful Saturday afternoon this year.

Grange hall "Grand Curtain"

Christine Hadsel from Curtains without Borders of Vermont was here on April 11th along with our volunteer work crew to properly take down and store the two curtains on the stage.

Pictured are our volunteers, the Grand curtain, the two curtains all rolled up and wrapped and the advertising curtain are pictured here. The project took about two hours in addition to the hard work from Tom Hurd and Brian Tanguay prior to the day of the project. A table was made measuring 20 X 12 feet in the center of the room to properly lay out the curtains and roll them up onto rug tubes. The stage was cleared of the display and the side walls had to be taken down to make room to move the curtains from their location. Once the room was prepared, 4 members climbed ladders to remove the top cross beam from the top of the stage frame, then 4 other members rolled up the curtain as it was lowered.

Once removed from the stage, the curtain was removed from the cross member and the roll on the bottom, then it was rolled up sideways onto the rug tube and wrapped in Tyvek to seal out the dust and dirt soon to be generated by the restoration of the room.

STARTING SCHOOL

When I started school in 1946 grades one through eight all went to the school in the precinct we lived in, so for me that was Templeton Center. My first year was not the greatest. The first week in school I was not happy at all. There were several times when I ran out the door and cut across the field in back of the Grange and ran home, only to have my mother bring me back. After a week or so I guess I got settled in a little better but my first year was not a good experience as I remember it. They kept changing teachers and by the end of the year there were some of us that got held back one of which was me. I only remember the name of one of them and her name was Sax. I can remember some of the older students calling her Sax Sax, battle ax Sax. I do not think she was very popular with them. My second year I had a teacher named Mrs. Murdock. She was very nice and things were much better.

Another teacher that I remember that was liked by all the students was Mrs. Knight. She lived across the street in the Templeton Inn for many years. There was also a teacher that came from St. Paul, MN that use to like to talk about living in St. Paul and what it was like with the tornados out there. She also liked what I guess you would call classical music. She would bring in a phonograph and have us listen to music by Bach and other people that I fail to remember now. She would tell us how some of them were blind and what great music they wrote. When I got older, I use to call the music, long hair stuff.

One person I do remember was one of our principals whose name I will not mention. We were outside during recess one day and a friend and I were wrestling. That was a popular thing on TV at the time. He came and grabbed both of us and took us into the boiler room. We told him we were playing but he would not listen and told us we were fighting. He made both of us bend down and hold our ankles while he hit us with a board. That afternoon when I got home my father noticed that there was something bothering me and asked me what it was. I told him what the principal had done and the next morning when I went to school, dad went with me. He went over to him and laid the law down. Dad told him, if you want him hit, you call me and tell me what he did and I will do the hitting. The principal never hit me again but I got yelled at for every little thing that I did. The following year there was a new principal named Mr. Scanlon and things were much better.
