Member Profile

I was born in Brooks village in 1917, and married Lincoln Stone of Otter River in 1941.

I graduated from Templeton High School, which now, with Phillipston, is Narragansett Regional High School. I graduated in 1939 from Worcester State Teachers College (now Worcester University; all the state colleges are now called universities). I taught first and second grade in Templeton Center for two years: 1939-1940, 1940-1941, both grades in one room. They didn't have Kindergarten then, and these poor little first-graders had never had to sit still in a chair before. It must have been a shock to those kids.

On my very first day of teaching, because I came from the town, ten mothers -- not all of them mothers of kids in my class -- came out of sheer curiosity to watch me teach my class. I was in a state of shock, complete shock, but I gathered myself together and got on with my teaching, such as it was.

Little Harry Drury sat in a chair and cried all day. "Harry," I said to him at the end of the day, "I could cry, too." That year was the most difficult time of my life. I didn't have the kind of instruction that they had at Fitchburg Teacher's College. Fitchburg specialized in elementary teaching, and for practice teaching every girl would have charge of a room and learn to deal with milk money and help kids who needed help with their clothes. I didn't have any of that. I think it was kind of a miracle that I got through that first year.

My second year was better. The kids I had taught in first grade weren't as good readers as Mrs. French's second-graders. She had been teaching forever -- I had her for a teacher in second grade. I didn't follow the methods and materials we had used at Worcester. I took out the materials that Mrs. French had used -- phonics -- and built up the second grade.

This was during the Depression. It was assumed that jobs were needed by men with families to support, so when I got married in 1941 I lost my job. But later, during World War II, the men were off at war, and they dropped that rule.

By that time, I was married and stayed home and took care of my kids. I got back into teaching in 1959, at a nursery school for children with challenges. That was half days and worked out very well.

At first I thought, "What am I doing? I don't know anything about how to help kids with challenges." Also, the job required driving into Boston once a month for meetings; so I told them I didn't want it. But then I thought, I should be able to do that; so I called back, and they accepted me. I doubt there would be many people who wanted that job.

I taught there for six years. Then Mrs. Finson retired, and I applied for her job teaching second grade in Otter River.

I taught fifth grade in Baldwinville for one year. Somehow, they had too many second grade teachers and asked for a volunteer to teach fifth grade. I said, "I'd hate to think that I couldn't do that."

Second graders' primary idea is to please the teacher. In 7th and 8th grade, where I substituted, the boys make all kinds of mischief and don't bother to conceal it, and the girls sneak around doing things.

I wasn't in on the beginning of the Historical Society. When I joined later, we would take our turn at overseeing when people came to look at things and made sure nothing was damaged. I guess we were supposed to answer questions, too.

Mrs. White started the teas. Her sister, Ruth Parkhurst, had a tea room in Petersham, and Mrs. White started doing a similar thing every Saturday in the garden. In my day, she was the backbone of the Historical Society, the one who really got things going.

For about three years I was in charge of getting people to work at the teas. After one time when somebody called at the last minute to say she couldn't do her tea, I decided that I would say: "If you find that you can't do it, get your own people to fill in."

I used to go to the teas when I was more mobile, but I haven't seen the building for a while. I remember the old post office, to the right as you go in the front door; the room across the hall, with old tea things; and the old kitchen with the fireplace.

DOES ANYONE REMEMBER THOMAS RYAN?

I wonder if there is anyone in town today that remembers Thomas Ryan. Thomas was an older gent that lived across the street from us when I was growing up. He had one glass eye and wore very thick eye glasses. There were not many people in town that did not know him. He did not own a car or drive. He always walked when ever he went somewhere or someone drove him. More often than not, he walked.

I can remember Thomas with his little wagon or wheelbarrow that he used all the time. You see, Thomas got his money by going around town picking up newspapers and rags which he sold to earn his living. At most anytime of the day you would see him either leaving his house or coming back with a load. You can imagine how many trips he had to make to get enough to fill up a van type truck. There was a barn attached to his house that he would fill up with these items and a truck would pick them up when he had enough. This was probably twice a year. He would bundle them up and tie the bundles with twine.

In 1957, I started working at Sears Roebuck in Gardner part time while I was in school. I was coming home with a friend that also worked there and we came upon an accident in front of what is now Wilson Bus Lines in East Templeton. It was Tom, he was walking home and had been hit by a car and killed. As I remember, it was just getting dark and it had been raining and it was Christmas Eve.


