A LITTLE HISTORY ON OUR FIRE DEPARTMENT

The first means of fighting a fire was probably the so called bucket brigade which consisted of people forming a line from a well or some other water source and passing buckets of water throwing it onto the fire. In 1843 this changed a little when a group of men purchased a fire engine and formed the Narragansett No.6 Engine Company. The engine was built by the Button Company and had a rotary pump that could be operated by four men. It more or less consisted of a pump and tub on wheels. They still needed the bucket brigade to supply it with water. The engine was quite small and was stored in a little building on Hubbardston Rd. between what is now the Grange Hall and the house south of it.

The first officers chosen for the engine were Mr. Stephen Maynard, Forman, John W. Work, Clerk, and Frank Fiske, Treasurer. The members of the company met monthly and were paid twenty cents for attendance and fighting fires. A boy could become a member at sixteen years of age. The company operated by collecting dues and at no expense to the town. In 1845, the engine company voted to disband and divided any funds that they had amongst all the members that were up to date on their dues.

In 1851, the Board of Selectman became involved and formed a new company and started to purchase fire engines for the villages of the town. Otter River would have Hero No.2, Brooks Village would have Tiger, Baldwinville would have the Ellsworth, and East Templeton would have the Bay State. In 1859, a new engine was purchased for Templeton Center from the Hunnerman & Co. It would retain the name Narragansett No. 6. All of these engines were capable of pumping water out of a pond, well or other water supply. Each of these engines required fifty to sixty men to operate them. Each also had a hose reel with fire hose. All of this

equipment was pulled to the fire by the men or horses.

As far as we know there are only two of these machines around today. The Ellsworth was later sold to Francistown, NH and renamed the Mt. Crotchet. It has been restored and is on display in a museum in that town. The Narragansett No. 6 and it's hose reel are still in Templeton and on display for everyone to enjoy at our museum on Boynton St.
