



"A moment in time"

John Brooks dairy farm.

Not many people in town realize it but there use to be a dairy farm right in the center of town. It was owned by John Brooks many years ago. It was located right next to what is now the historical society museum. I never realized how big his barn was until the other day while standing in back of the museum I noticed the ramp made out of stone that use to go into the back of it. The barn has been gone for many years now but I would guess that it was about a hundred feet long. Mr. Brooks pastured his cattle in a large field that went all the way to the rear of the trailer park below the post office in Templeton Center.

My grandparents lived two houses past the office and I can remember Mr. Brooks leading the cows to the lower field. There was a fenced in path that went along the edge of the pasture and it was lined with two rows of Weeping Willow trees. The trees were from the fence posts, which were Willow taking root and growing into these beautiful trees. Mr. Brooks always had knee high rubber boots. In the pasture in back of the trailer park there was a big well with a large wooden cover on it with a hand pump. Next to the pump was a big round cast iron tub that he would fill up every day for his herd.

Back up at the farm there was a small building that in my time was the post office. From what I have read, it was originally built to be a print shop by a Mr. Bushnell who was going to start a news paper but changed his mind and went to Gardner and started the Gardner News. It later became a small grocery store which I believe was operated by Mr. Brooks.

In our book *Images of America, Templeton* on page 26, you will see a picture of Leonard and Lawrance Brooks with the milk wagon on the common.
