The Grange hall project is moving right along, a display project we've been featuring here is the Church window, the frame is now built, the wiring and lights are installed and the outer frame (right) has been scraped, primed, and painted with its first coat. Once the window is raised into the final resting spot, the frame will be created to secure the white trim outer frame to the front of the window.

Tuesday nights appear to be our best time to get things done upstairs, moving, cleaning, and building in preparation for our many displays.

Panels have been installed to diffuse the lights and spread it out to better illuminate the stained glass window.

Meanwhile, the bathrooms are moving forward with hot water, toilets, sinks, and running water. Doors will be installed this week and the trim will be finished. Windows are still on order but will be done in the next few months. Not to worry, there are plenty of projects to keep everyone busy.

SOME OF THE PAST FIRES IN OUR TOWN

After seeing how so many of the town's residents were affected from the loss of Francis Leland's store (The Red Onion), I decided to write about some of the fires in the past, some that involved town property.

One of these fires that were a big loss to the town was a fire that destroyed the Templeton High School in December, 1921. The building and contents was a total loss. The school had closed on Friday for Christmas vacation. The janitor had been working in the building on Saturday and had left at 10:30 that night.

A neighbor saw flames coming out of the windows at 6:30 the next morning and turned in the alarm. According to a story from the Gardner News it was already a total loss. By 7:30 the roof had fallen and all was lost. The loss was estimated at \$80,000 dollars with an insurance of only \$7,000 dollars.

Upon returning from Christmas vacation the students were schooled in the hall of the Otter River School. The old Elm Street School which stood next to the Baptist church was also reopened for use.

Fitting right in with story is another school fire years later in October 1933. This school was the very school that was used to ease the citation of the high school fire. The fire was discovered shortly before midnight. This building located on Main Street in Otter River was also a total loss having only a portion of the front wall standing after the fire was extinguished. The loss was estimated at \$100,000 dollars. (More next month)
