Our first experience with the Church window was back in 2004 when we decided to move it into the first floor of the Grange hall kitchen. Then in 2012 we designed a plan with Mike Matuszewski and Bill Harris to lift it up and slide it into the second floor.

Now almost 20 years later and hours of planning, it's time to stand it up and place it in its final display location. A team of volunteers are working on the frame and light box, hoists are being placed to slowly raise the window to the upright position.





It is more stressful than the time we lifted it into the second floor. But over planning is the key to success. A model of the window with the lifting points was made to see the plan in action, and it worked perfectly. We will need around 10 people, if you are interested in helping

complete this once in a lifetime project, you are welcome to join us. Follow us on our Facebook page for dates and times.

Once the window is in place, we can finish the hardwood floors and set up the pews, clocks, displays, and whatever else is to be displayed up on the second floor.



THE HILLCREST HOTEL

I am wondering how many people in our town have ever heard of the Hill Crest Hotel. I do not know when this building exited but I believe it was in the early 1900's sometime after the building of the Templeton Inn and was known as Templeton's newest summer hotel with a stable adjoining it. The hotel was owned by a gentleman named J.H. Gould from Somerville, MA. The building was located on Ladder Hill at the location where the Wilson family now lives and has a farm.

Unfortunately the hotel was destroyed by a fire early in the morning that it was scheduled to open. A gentleman named Waverly Oliver stated that he had passed by the area at midnight and saw no sign of a fire but by 1:30 the building and stable were in flames. The bell on the engine house was sounded at about 1:05 and the bell on the church sounding shortly after. The hand tub Narragansett No. 6 was drawn to the fire by an auto truck owned by G.W. Bourn. Steamer No. 2 from the East Templeton engine house arrived shortly after but nothing could be done. Everything was lost.

It is said that the road side on both sides of Ladder Hill was lined with autos from Gardner and Templeton.

This information came from a write up from the Gardner News. I do not have the date of the story. Shown below is a picture of the hotel showing what a beautiful building it was.

September 27, 2023 Wednesday night around 10pm I opened the Facebook app to see that the Red Onion was on fire, that's all it said. I headed down to the area and parked in the Paper Co. lot to see fire trucks, police cruisers, and emergency vehicles parked surrounding the Onion with lights flashing. Smoke began to billow out the roof and sparks were falling from the attic as seen through the second floor window. Four firefighters were on the ladder entering the second floor through the window and proceeded to punch out all

the windows, smoke exited like a cloud of cotton. Soon the firefighters exited the building and the trucks pulled a safe distance and they began to pump water onto and into the building, only to see flames starting to fill the second floor and exit through the windows reaching heights of 50 feet or more.

Patrons and neighbors watched in horror as this 142 year old fixture in Otter River began to collapse, within minutes the roof collapsed and the second floor was completely engulfed. I witnessed this historic and horrific event from every angle and with many members of the community. We shared some thoughts but mostly stood silent as the building created by Francis Leland and cared for by numerous individuals for so many years appeared to have met it's end.

The new owners, Steve and Matt have said, "This is not goodbye, it's see you soon." Which gives the area a glimmer of hope that it's not over. So we'll wait for them to figure out the next step, create a plan, and decide what course of action will be taken.

Preserving history is complicated, what do we save? What story do you write for the next generation? We all have the power to make history, write the ending and share it with our grandchildren, we include them to carry on, in some way, to make things better, to continue the process and give them the strength to make their own history in our town.

Most of what we do at the Historical Society is positive and uplifting, we share the his-

tory left to us from previous generations. It's heartbreaking to report on this type of historic event, just as our ancestors had to do with similar tragedies. I'm hopeful that something good will come of this and I look forward to sharing it with all of you.
