THOSE GOOD OLD DAYS-- part 2

Last month I talked about some of the pranks that some of the kids pulled but I don't want to make it sound like that was the norm. During this time of the year many of us would take snow shovels and head out trying to earn a few cents cleaning driveways and sidewalks for people. The winters were quite different than they are nowadays. Getting a foot of snow during a storm was the norm. We did not charge a lot in today's numbers. Maybe fifty cents or a dollar depending how long the walk or driveway was. You have to remember that back then; a dollar per hour in a shop was what many people received. If we got a few cents to buy candy or soda with we were satisfied. Most of the people that we shoveled for were elderly and couldn't afford much anyway.

Another way we earned money in the summer time was picking blueberries. One of the best places that we had to pick them was out in back of the historical society museum. It is pretty well filled in with trees and brush but back then there was an abundance of bushes out there. We would get a pail with a handle on it, (usually a peanut butter pail). We would take a piece of clothes line and tie it around our waist with the pail hanging in front and pick with two hands. Many times we had the quart sold before we had even picked them.

Another little business we would have was selling night crawlers for fishing. When it rained, we could be found picking night crawlers in front of the inn, on the common, or in front of the school. We could each fill a can in no time. We stored them in old wash tubs or some other type of container and sold them for a penny each. Of course we enjoyed fishing too so we used some of them.

The area where we went fishing is pretty well forgotten now. We would walk to East Templeton and fish out of what was known then as First Pond. It was in front of the old Edgewater Café. Where is that??? The café was the old power plant for the electric cars when they were running. The building is gone today. The area where we sat and fished is now a parking lot for the package store across from Hultala Oil Co. Much of the land has been filled in and the pond sits empty with brush growing in it. The dam was blown out years ago and never replaced. The town had taken land with plans to replace the dam and make a recreation area around the pond but never went any further than taking the land. I believe it was going to be state funded at the time. The pond was also a popular ice skating area. Mr. Lajoie on North Main St. used to have a small building on the shore of the pond. He would heat it and let the skaters use it to put their skates on.
