


Phillipston Historical Society Meeting Tuesday night 7pm June 30th

"A moment in time"

LEAVING TOWN [part 1]

In 1962, I decided to enlist into the U.S. Coast Guard and on the morning February 6, 1962, I left Templeton heading for Cape May, NJ for boot Camp. This would be the furthest that I had been from Templeton in my entire life.

I was not too sure what I was in for but I had a pretty good idea. One of the main things I was told by people that I knew that had been in the service was to keep my mouth shut and don't volunteer for anything. I went down on a Grey Hound bus and was dropped off at a point in Cape May where we were supposed to call someone from. There were six of us that got dropped off. After calling the number that we were given, a small grey bus came and got us and brought us to the base. Once the bus got to the base everything changed. We were put into a group called forming company and a few guys were picked to have their hair cut off. Next, they were handed the clippers and they became the barbers. Later, a guy came in and asked who liked dogs. I remembered what I was told and kept my mouth shut. The first one that responded was told that he was the mail man. Next we were marched to a building where we were measured and issued our clothing etc.

After a few days we were formed into a company and became Quebec 48 and moved into another barracks which would be our home for 13 weeks. This would include a lot of being yelled at, exercise, schooling, and training, all worthwhile I might add.

After boot camp, I put in for Radio School and got accepted. I had to report to Groton, CT and started school the following week. After about four month, I flunked out of radio school because I could not take Morse Code fast enough. From there, I was transferred to a ship in Boston named Castle Rock, a 311 foot cutter.

I reported on board the Castle Rock on a Friday and was told that she was leaving for ocean station, Bravo on Monday morning. I was given the weekend off and had to be back by 7:00 AM Monday morning. This was in mid October and I was about to start a whole new lifestyle like nothing I would have ever imagined.
