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

Words from the woods

There are some invasive bushes out in the woods. One is flame bush, also called burning bush. It has bright red leaves in the fall and is very striking. In the yard, it's an ornamental. As an escapee in the woods it is considered an invasive, taking the place of a native plant. Barberry is another escapee. It's often used as a hedge as it handles being trimmed and has pretty red berries. Some have thorns. Glossy Buckthorn is the hardest to remove, and spreads aggressively.

The few flame bush and fewer barberries will be fairly easy to remove. The buckthorn will require vigilance. It should be pulled out by the roots if it's small enough. If not, it can be cut, and the cut painted with a chemical to kill it. If it is cut and not treated, it will send up 4-10 sprouts that will need to be dealt with. I have been marking them with yellow tape. If you can rip it out, great! If not, leave it be, we'll get it on a work crew sometime.

I'll be keeping an eye out for you.

Gasoline, Yesterday and Today

I was just thinking about how much a gallon of gas cost today compared to back in time and where it can be purchased. I can remember when I was a boy being with my father stopping for gas and having the attendant coming up to the car and saying, how much and dad usual answer was, put in a dollar's worth. I so not know what the price was per gallon at the time. The lowest price can remember seeing posted on a gas pump was 25 cents a gallon. I am sure back then it would have been lower. At today's prices, for a quarter you would probably get to sniff the nozzle on the pump.

As for where you were going to purchase your gas, there were many options. I will go so far as to say today, Route 2A, now Patriots Road would be called Gasoline Alley. There were what was called hilling station all the way through East Templeton and Templeton. As you came into East Templeton center from Gardner, there was a filling station on the right just after North Main Street. Next, across from the Methodist Church was Lovell's Garage operated by Pearly Lovell. A few hundred feet up the road at what is now the Wiley property, was Brooks's filling station. A little further up the street where Cumberland Farm's is now located stood another station which I cannot identify. As you go over Ladder Hill and head down the

Templeton side, there was another station that was operated by the Hendrickson family. This is now where B.T. Seamless Guttering store there material... A little further down on the left was Shaw's Filling Station. The station has since been taken down and was replaced with a full service garage later Pat's Farm Stand. It is now part of C.O & S Auto Repair. Further up on the right was a garage built by Sheldon Evens that sold gas and did auto repair. After several different owners, it is now owned by Jeff Lawrence and used to store heavy equipment. Just out of the center of Templeton on the left stands what used to be a full service station that has not been used for many years. As you go down the hill you come to a café known as the Candlelight which at one time many years ago also served as a filling station. Further up the road just before you enter into Phillipston, there is a location on the left where Jeannie's Lunch once stood. Many years ago this too was a filling Station. A picture of this station is shown

below. There were many others throughout the town also.

Let's go over what's going on lately.

Logging. The 23 acres is about 3/4 of the way completed with the cutting, some logs are piled up at the landing, many have been removed with the rest to be picked up in the next few days. Checks are in the mail as of Thursday the 28th. The total paid so far for delivered logs is approximately \$10,000.00, exact numbers will be reported at the next meeting. We are now in a holding pattern to allow the grounds to dry up so they can resume the cutting and move the rest of the wood to the landing. Some deep ruts have been dug due to the high water table but those will be filled in upon completion of the project. What will be left is the slash, or tree tops. Work crews are being formed to begin creating a walking trail hopefully wide enough to bring out a small tractor with a wood chipper. We hope to chip away most of the branches left in the trails system area and leave the rest to let mother nature handle it in the coming years. The Chestnut trees were put on hold due to the delay in the completion of the logging. Planting will be planned for the 2023 spring season.

Grange Hall. We are waiting for the roughing in of the wiring to begin the insulation process of the second floor. Once that is completed, we will have used up the CPC grant money allocated for those jobs. Grant applications are being submitted in the next week or so to prepare the board for the fall town meeting with hopes we get approval to move this project forward. We have also been receiving private donations for the Grange project of almost \$9,000.00 to date. Thank you to Chair City Oil for their generous 5k donation along with an anonymous estate gift of \$3,250.00 from a diamond sale brokered by Tanguay Jewelers, and several donations from our members who want to see this project completed. It's truly an exciting time to be part of this wonderful plan to open the Grange hall after almost 60 years of hibernation.

Open house. We have begun the regular open house every Tuesday night from 6-8pm and we are starting to open up on Saturday from 1-5 depending on participation. Check our calendar on page 3 form coming events contingent on the Selectman's approval and volunteer participation. We will also try to be open if there are any events on the common such as the Cultural Council's band concerts planned.

Endowment fund. Even though we are focused on restoring the Grange hall, we are still adding to our endowment fund, now over \$25,000.00 and we will soon covert our stock certificates into the endowment fund adding anther \$22,000.00. The goal for this endowment fund is to have an income capable of paying our annual bills to maintain the buildings. It is well on it's way in doing just that. We are here forever and we need to plan accordingly. Those of us in office must leave the organization in a sustainable position for the next generation. The struggle to achieve this goal only needs to be done once, let's make it a pleasure to serve in this organization where we can focus on education, genealogy, and preservation of the artifacts and not the fear of running out of fuel or electricity. We will have a much easier time finding volunteers who know the Society is strong and growing. Thanks to all of you for your support and your membership.
