#### REMEMBERING DOCTOR ROBERTS

I wonder how many people in town can remember Doc. Roberts. Doc. Roberts was thee doctor in town when I was a boy. I had many dealings with him in my younger years. His name was Oscar Roberts and he was what you would call an old country doctor. He came to your house whenever he was called day or night. If it was late at night you could usually see his pajamas sticking out of the bottom of his long coat and he always had that black bag with him that always seemed to have just what he needed in it.

Back when I was just a little shaver, I didn't want anything to do with him but as I grew up I realized how much the people in town respected him. Years ago the people in town named the bridge over

Route 2 on Baldwinville Road for him. The sign is still there but it could use some attention.

My first run in with Doc. Roberts that I can remember was when I caught my big toe in the spokes of my tricycle and tore it up quite a bit. I was scared to death when they brought me to him but he put me back together and I still have that toe so I guess he did a good job.

Later during my elementary school years, it seemed like figured out how to catch a different disease each year. One year it was Chicken Pox, then Mumps, Measles, and then Scarlet Fever. Scarlet Fever was the one that got everybody's attention. They made my parents put a yellow quarantine sign in the front window and the school destroyed all my books. I really didn't feel that bad and could not understand what all the fuss was about. I guess I was pretty lucky as I never had any after effects from it.

As I got older I can remember some of the older guys talking about the doctor's car that he use to have. Apparently during world War II, new cars were very hard to come by unless you were someone of importance such as a doctor. I guess it was a popular year as not many were manufactured.

Many years later when I was employed by the town, someone did a painting of Doctor Roberts and it was hung on the wall of the Baldwinville Cooperative Bank for everybody to see. I do not know where it went after the bank closed. I asked around hoping that I could find it and perhaps have it displayed at the historical society museum but I was unable to locate it. I have been told that it might have gone to his family.
