



## **Tuckers on Norcross Hill**

The property at 68 Norcross Hill was bought, for Fred and Mable Tucker, in Nov. 1906 from Ora V. Norcross and Martha S. Norcross (widow of Austin Norcross). Fred and Mable had five children, Beatrice, Edwin, Blanche, Gordon and Minna. The property came to Edwin Locke Tucker upon the death of his parents. The family has always referred to the place as "the Farm".

Edwin and Eleanor Tucker had four children, Gordon, Susan (me), Byron and Karen. Dad, Col. E. L. Tucker, U S Army, moved many times during his career, so we all went along most of the time. In between moves we often stayed up here on Norcross Hill with my Grandparents until housing was found at the new assignment. Another time we lived on Baldwinville Road (called South Main St. then) for a few years.

In 1957 Dad retired from the military, and the family settled here at 68 Norcross Hill. He made many improvements to the house as well as the fields and woods. He taught at Narragansett Regional for about 10 years and retired again! He was active on town committees, was chair of the Historical Commission, and was a member of the Historical Society. He passed away in 1993 and Mother (Eleanor) in 1994. Karen became the owner of the property on Norcross Hill at that time.

Karen taught science at Narragansett Regional School for 38 years, and lived on Norcross Hill. Gordon Tucker became a U S Air force officer; (Edwin) Byron Tucker became a U S Navy officer and both families were very mobile, living wherever the assignments took them.

I worked as a Registered Dietitian Nutritionist for 40 years, four in Massachusetts and then 36 with the Veterans Affairs Medical Center in Palo Alto, CA. I married Al Frugoli in 1965, we bought a house in CA and we had one son, Alfred. My husband passed away in 1993, I retired from the VA in 1995 and in 1996 Alfred and I moved back to Norcross Hill and joined Karen in the farm. Alfred graduated from Springfield College in 1997, worked in Worcester and lived up here in our log house at 88 Norcross Hill. He got his Masters Degree from Worcester state University. Alfred and his wife Heather and their three children now live in Chelmsford MA.

Byron was killed in action in Vietnam in 1967 and his family now lives in Virginia. The old primary school building on Baldwinville Road, that is now affordable apartments, is named *The Tucker Building* after Byron.

Gordon lives in CA with his daughter and son-in-law. He drives east every summer to stay up here at "The Farm" with Karen and me. Then he drives back to CA in early October. He stops along the way to visit with various relatives and friends and seems to enjoy the long drive.

The house at 68 Norcross Hill was first entered in the record of Deeds in 1807 according to research Dad did. So, the house undoubtedly was built before that, say 1799 (sounds good!!) Anyway, it has had many years standing here on the east side of the hill with its view of Baldwinville, Gardner, Old Town Winchendon, Temple Mountain, Ipswich Hills, Mt. Watatic, Ashburnham Hills, and viewed from out in the fields, Mount Monadnock to the north.

There may even be a May pole set up for the kids to enjoy and create new memories of Templeton.




## June Tea with a kick

#### Hanging out in front of the post office

## President's Page

One of my pet projects is the research on Sarah Goodridge. Knowing that our Historical Society has the second largest collection of her miniature paintings on display in the country has created a decade of research ranging from organizing the documents currently stored in the upstairs closet, to labeling each portrait with a proper description. I have scoured the internet saving every image from other Museums and Historical Societies who share a collection as we do. In the 1960's Eleanor Whidden realized that some of the miniatures were handed down to family members who didn't have a strong sense of keeping the family collections. She heard that some of Sarah's paintings were to be sold to the Boston Museum of Fine Arts and her passion brought her to buy the paintings and donate them to the Narragansett Historical Society where he felt they belonged. She is a descendant of Sarah and had a few of her own in her private collection, which also made their way home to Templeton. This is all documented in her notes to Helen Parkhurst and Mrs. White, both founding members of the re-organization of the Historical Society.

In Eleanor's notes she mentions a portrait of a woman and a man who is believed to be Sarah's Mother and Father, but no proof of this was ever found. The family resemblance is believable, but the dates do not add up. The images below are; in color the do nated portrait from Eleanor, the oval black and white image is a portrait from the Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York with a label of "unknown" as was ours. In our scrap book and in the Grange are two identical images one a pencil drawing seen below in the center and the other a large painted portrait. The pencil drawing appears to be a copy of the portrait in the Grange.

Could this be Sarah's portrait painting of her Minister Charles Wellington from the First Church? The years match up, the resemblance is very close, and it was very common for parishioners to save photographs and paintings of Ministers during this period of time. I invite you to compare these images and paintings for yourself once the snow melts and the building is open again for the sea-

If this information is found to be true, we can share our findings with the Met in New York and these portraits will finally have a name listed for the first time in many years.

CHARLES WELLINGTON was born on 20 Feb 1780 in Waltham, Middlesex, MA. He died on 03 Aug 1861 in Templeton, Worcester, MA. He married (1) ANNA SMITH on 20 May 1807 in Templeton, Worcester, MA. She was born on 29 Aug 1783 in Halifax, Nova Scotia. She died on 24 Apr 1830 in Templeton, Worcester, MA. He married (2) ADELAIDE Russell (daughter of Absalom Russell and Sarah Frink) on 27 Jul 1831 in Templeton, Worcester, MA. She was born on 25 Nov 1795 in Paxton, Worcester, MA. She died on 22 Mar 1870 in Templeton, Worcester, MA.
