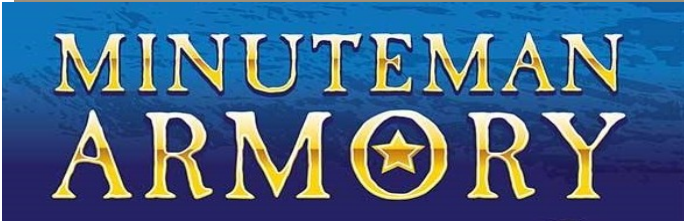
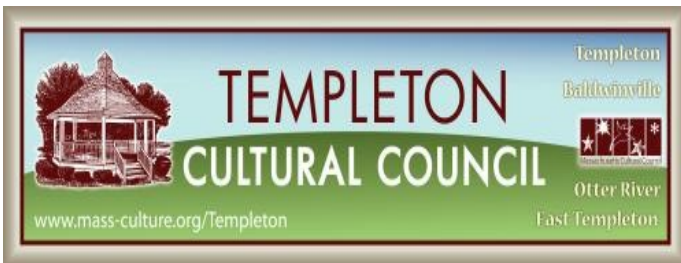

“A moment in time”

September 20th, Templeton Center, final part.

Templeton Center did not receive very much, if any flood damage during the hurricane that I have read about, probably due to the fact that it is the highest part of the town and does not have any rivers flowing through the populated areas. This does not mean by any means that it was spared. The steeple on the First Church was blown off by the hurricane winds and pierced through the roof and into the church. The patched ceiling was still visible until a few years ago when the inside of the church was painted.

The only major damage that I am familiar with, or have been told about, is the destruction of a barn owned by a gentleman named Moses Leland on Dudley Rd. The story about the barn was told to me by Mr. Richard Kendall. The story goes like this. Mr. Kendall, who was a photographer, saw the barn moving in the wind and knew it would not survive. He set his camera up and was waiting for it to become airborne. His mother saw what he was doing and not think this was right, she knocked the camera over just as the barn shown below in a photo by Mr. Kendall was destroyed.



The only other story I have been told about the hurricane in Templeton Center was by my mother telling about how their chicken coop was picked up blown out into the pasture and the chickens were getting blown all around the field. I am sure there were other stories of buildings and trees that were damaged or destroyed but none that I have heard of.

According to *The Story of Templeton*, the biggest loss to the Town of Templeton was loss in taxes from the government taking the land and buildings to construct Birch Hill dam. The total tax loss at the time was \$8,435.00 which by today’s standards would be much more.

There are many more photos about the flood at the museum. Stop in to see them sometime.
