ROADS FROM THE PAST

Since the town was incorporated, there have been many roads that have been discontinued, abandoned and renamed. In Otter River there are three listed in the 1912 street list. One was called German St. Back in the day when Otter River was known as Factory Village, There were quite a few German immigrants living in the village and what is now Liberty Street was then German Street. Another one was River St. which went from Crotty Avenue to Main Street connecting just below the Otter River Hotel. This street was abandoned but never discontinued. There was also a street called Murray Avenue. I have not been able to find where this street was located.

In Baldwinville there were several. One was North Main St. which crossed over the railroad tracks at Circle St and went on to what is now Bridge St. After the bridge was built over the tracks, it became Bridge St. Day Mill Road was cut off when RT. 202 was relocated due to the flood control project. Mechanic St., Meadow St., and Rosemont St. are streets that were done away with after the flood in 1938 for the Birch Hill dam project after being taken over by the U.S. Government. There were two named Cross St. and Depot St. That I have not been able to locate.

In Templeton there was Harold Road off Otter River Road which is now part of North Main Street and Old Otter River Road which went from Otter River Road to Lord Rd is now part of Lord Road. There was an old cart road known as Robbins Rd. which came off Baldwinville Rd. before the RT. 2 bridge and went down to Trout Brook and connected with Church Hill Rd. and there was West Rd. which went on to RT. 202 in Baldwinville. The Haskell Rd. which goes off Cook Rd. and connected with Farnsworth Rd back in the day. Lamb City Rd. was abandoned at one time but never discontinued and years later had to be put back into shape after someone built a home on it. There was also a road in Brooks Village that went from Carruth Rd to Phillipston Rd. This road was Valiton Rd. and was named after my great grandparents who owned the old Carruth farm. The farm was destroyed by a fire.

East Templeton had Underwood Road which went from North Main Street by Underwood pond and connected on to Otter River Road. Underwood Pond is today known as the Ridgely Club. There was Ahlstrom Avenue that today is Lake Avenue. Most of Mechanic Street which merged with Sawyer Street was destroyed by the flood in 1938. Pail Factory at one time connected with Mill Street. It was what is known as a corduroy road which is a way they use to build roads in swampy areas by laying logs down and building the road on top of them kind of like a floating road. This portion of the road sank while being worked on and had to be abandoned.
