

There may even be a May pole set up for the kids to enjoy and create new memories of Templeton. Noon To 4pm




June 27th Tea Theme

My first brush with the law

My first attempt at being a thief was when I was about 9 or 10 years old I think. I am guessing on the age. Things were a lot different then and our parents didn't have to worry about perverts as they were uncommon back then. I think if we had ever had one around, our parents would have taken the individual out behind the barn or to some wood lot and handled it. Anyway some of us kids in the center would go out into a pine grove that Mr. Brooks owned in back of his pasture and play, climbing the trees, and making shelters out of pine branches. Well, in back of the old Clover Farm Store there were two rows of garages that belonged to the Templeton Inn which were no longer used. There were a few people that rented parts of them for different things. One was rented by Louis Oliver for a little welding business. A couple of people stored old cars in them and one section was rented by Mr. Pokki for a wood shop. I believe he made chair parts for a local factory. Well we happened to be playing in the area and spotted the pile of lumber that he used in his work. We got the bright idea of taking some of it to build us a little cabin in the pine grove. I don't remember how much we took but I would guess probably a dozen or so boards and carried them out into the woods.

Come morning when Mr. Pokki arrived at his shop, I imagine it was obvious that the pile had been disturbed and the police were called. In those days the police was Mr. Hawkes who was also the school janitor. Well you can imagine how long it took to solve the case with the nice little path going down through the field right to the pine grove and it was no secret that it was our play ground. Mr. Hawkes called our parents and we were brought to Mr. Pokki's shop to talk to him and Mr. Hawkes. I looked to my dad for help and his exact words were, you got yourself into it, you get yourself out of it. Our very next job was heading out into the pine grove and bringing all the boards back while the elders watched. This was the end of my criminal career and something I never forgot. A lesson well learned.

I think the elders probably really got a kick out of it and laughed at us after because the lumber was kiln dried Birch, a very hard wood so we would have bent a lot of nails trying to use it. As I grew up, Mr. Hawkes and Mr. Pokki became very good friends with us kids, both men being fire fighters and Mr. Pokki also became a police officer.
