The March 12th Selectman's meeting created a conversation when a vote was made to halt large events on the Common due mostly to safety concerns and interference with the construction of the new School. The You Tube video taken by Templeton TV was shared on our Facebook group and the comments of our townspeople soon erupted. The Mac & Cheese was first on the chopping block with the Craft Fair next on the list. With over 300 comments and the Selectmen's ear close by, the subject was soon introduced for further debate at the March 26th meeting. The realization that this decision will affect the Historical Society, The Lion's Club, Halloween, and any other "Large" event made an impact they didn't see coming. With some changes, it appears that we will all enjoy the Common as we have in the past but under the watchful eye of the town offices, police, CERT, and our members.

ENJOYING THE 4th OF JULY ON THE FIRE DEPARTMENT

Back when I was growing up, my dad was a member of the fire department and every year on the night before the 4th of July, some of the fire fighters would stand by the fire alarm box on the pole in the center of town and at the station which was on Wellington Rd at the time. This was curbing the kids from turning in false alarms which was a favorite thing to do on that night. Usually it didn't do much good because as soon as they went home for the night, the alarm would get sounded and they had to respond anyway.

In 1966, after I got discharged from the service, I became a member of the department. Around that time, many of the older members were getting off and there were quite a few younger men on, and the department changed from having Chief Engineers to having one fire chief and each station had a deputy chief. They also came up with the idea of paying the men for one hour to stand by the station on the night before the 4th. For this, the men agreed to man the stations until midnight and respond to any bon fires or false alarms for that amount of pay. The men would put their pay together and make it a night to enjoy. They would purchase clams and steaks and make it a cook out. Each station did this and everyone had a good time. The police officers that were on duty would stop in and partake also.

This was a great thing but as years went on it started getting a little wild. One of the men showed up with a small canon some black powder and the fun started. We would load the canon with toilet paper and fire it in front of the station about a half dozen times or more. The vibration from it would set off the alarm at the Templeton Lunch each time we fired it. The canon was a miniature Civil War canon on wheels. People

would stop by and wait for the canon to be fired. Later one of the men whose family owned a shop that worked with metal made his own canon and when he got ready to fire it, he realized that he had forgotten to make a ram to pack the powder in with. It just happened that the local Lions Club was selling brooms and he had gotten one for his wife and it was still in his truck. Well he loaded the canon and pushed the broom handle down into the bore of the canon which went a little hard. In fact it was stuck in the canon and would not come out. The only alternative was to shoot it out. He lit the fuse and we all stood back. The canon went off with a great report and the broom was nowhere to be found.

Eventually cook outs and canons faded out and they stopped manning the stations. The fire department did away with the fire alarms and equipped each firefighter alert's, a device that lets them know when they are needed. If you listen on the 4th you might still hear one of these canons going off. At least one of them is still around.

In order to move the items into the document room, we will need to catalog, box, and label everything and get it on the computer so we can have a searchable database to make it simple to find documents and photographs, along with saving our researchers valuable time. Chair City Oil has donated another \$1,000.00 to help us get things done. They are so impressed with our efforts and successes they just had to chip in. In my conversation with David Tourigny, he asked what we need, I suggested we use the money to buy a computer for the document room along with materials needed to finish the job. He quickly donated his computer to us since it is being replaced with a faster model. My son Seth donated a flat screen monitor to go with the system, and we have a scanner/ printer already, so that will give us a big head start in having a searchable system in our control. A Bourn Hadley desk was donated and will be used as an office desk for the computer and for research in the document/ Hadley room.

The electrician will install all cables, phone lines, electricity, and lights in that room for future use, a phone can be set up there to communicate between the two buildings if both are open. We currently do not have plans for an internet connection at this time due to the high cost.


So you can see our directors and officers have been busy this winter to prepare for the 2018 season which will begin in April when we turn the water back on and have our Tuesday nights at the Museum again.

What else is in the works? Well, we want to move the Tin shop wagon out of the second floor and into the carriage shed along with the fire hose reel which is on the first floor. The reason is, with the new doors, the opening is too small to move them, so let's do it now.

For painters, we have more shutters that need attention, and the back porch needs to be scraped and painted to give us a nice clean look for our garden parties and teas.

The NHS Fund at the Community Foundation is growing rapidly, our sponsors checks are being deposited directly and we are moving \$5,000.00 from our checking account to take advantage of the higher interest rate while the money is sitting there. It's our money and we can use it any time we want, just a phone call and a check will be sent.
