Through the stain glass windows

Many of you may not recognize the name Moses W. Richardson, he is responsible for 2 of our incredible artifacts, the Stained-glass windows from the Templeton Inn and the Trinitarian Church.

A brief history, Moses W. Richardson was born in Fitzwilliam NH, while he was still an infant, his mother, originally from Templeton who recently lost her husband moved back to Templeton, when old enough Moses worked at the general store, Mr. Richardson moved to Boston where he made a good career in the dry goods business, Mr. Richardson never lost sight of where his start in dry good began and always wanted to do something for his hometown, in the late 1890s, he returned to Templeton and from talking to residents had decided Templeton needed a hotel, since the previous hotel had burned in the 1880s. Percival Blodgett who owned the land on which the previous hotel once stood, and Mr. Richardson made a deal, Richardson bought the land and a house for the sum of one dollar with the

stipulation "This conveyance is made upon the express condition that said grantee his heirs and assignees shall build and furnish an inn for the entertainment of guests upon said premises within one year from the date hereof (15th day of July in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety nine) at an expense of not less than \$25,000 otherwise it shall revert to said grantor his heirs and assignees".

Mr. Richardson went to work building what was to be the Templeton Inn, he preferred the name Inn over hotel as he felt it Sounded more like being home.





One of the main features of this building

were the transom windows of the main hall, these were made by redding, Baird & CO's Studios, we have this one on Display in the main Building, it was a donation from Steve Salame in memory of his mother Gladys, the window was saved when the building was being renovated and all these windows were removed, another 60 rooms were added to the original 40 rooms. In 1927 it became known as The Landlords Inn after being bought by a group of landlords that owned 25 inns around New England and New York. Toy Town Tavern in Winchendon was one. Around 1935, the chain went bankrupt, and the inn was sold at auction. A gentleman named Waverly Oliver from Templeton purchased it and started tearing the building down to its original size to be used as an apartment building. While doing this around 1945 or 46, Mr. Oliver fell to his death from a staging while working on the building. The next owners continued to use it as apartments for many years until the town took it for back taxes and had it torn down. The Templeton Center fire station now occupies this site.



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POST OFFICE'S COME TO THE TOWN OF TEMPLETON

According to what I have read the records of the U.S. Post-Office Department do not show when a postmaster was first appointed for Templeton. The earliest records show that Thomas Wilder was postmaster in 1802. In 1803, Lovell Walker was appointed and served until 1809 when he was replaced by Caleb Leland. Lipha French was appointed in 1810 and served until 1829 followed by Artemas Lee. In 1843 John Boynton was appointed and served until 1848. Others that served were George Jones 1848, Dexter Gilbert 1849, Addison Lincoln 1849, Dexter Gilbert 1853, Artemas Lee 1863, Henry Smith 1865, Julius Jones 1867, Percival Blodgett 1869, and Delia Damon 1885.

The post office in Templeton Center was the only one in the town until 1830 when a second post office was established in the village of Baldwinville. The postmasters appointed for Baldwinville were Joseph Davis 1830, James Clapp 1853, Edwin Sawyer 1861, Otis Sawin 1870, Ezra Lamb, 1874, and George Bryant 1885.

In 1860, a third office was established in the village of Otter River. The first postmaster for this office was Samuel Osgood appointed in 1860 followed by Francis Leland in 1867 and Frederick Warner in 1885.

The fourth post office was established in the village of East Templeton in 1866 with Fitch Sargeant as the postmaster, a position that he held for many years.

Brooksvillage did not have a post office. Many of the residents living there paid a gentleman named David Spear to pick up the mail at the post office in Templeton Center .

The post office in Templeton Center was once located in (Union Store 9now the historical building). From there it moved to the Artemas Lee building, then to a small building owned by John Brooks then to the pre-

sent location. The post office was located in the Francis Leland building and later closed, date unknown. In East Templeton it was in a store owned by Fitch Sargeant, later moved to the GAR building and then to its present location. The Baldwinville office has had several locations, some due to buildings be destroyed by fires. The present office was built at the location of the old school house next to where the Baptist church stood. Below is the old Templeton Center office.

The dogwood tree planted behind the sunken garden has sustained shock over the winter and it appears to be alive and budding, so we are hopeful that it will continue to thrive and become a showpiece in our garden in the coming years.
