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"Death Becomes Her"

"Black is becoming; and young widows, fair, plump and smiling with their roguish eyes sparkling under their black veils are very seducing." – Robert de Valcourt, The Illustrated Manners Book, 1855

"Death Becomes Her," an exhibit on the change in the style of mourning clothes during the mid 1800s to the early 1900s, including the Civil War, when many women decided against wearing mourning clothes because there had just been too much death. The exhibit will be open Tuesdays and Saturdays in October, with a presentation by a costumed interpreter (a 60something widow dressed in black) at 2 p.m.



each Saturday. On display will be three of the historical society's framed hair wreaths, as well as hair jewelry, along with other objects of mourning, as a lead-in to the Pumpkin Festival. Fashioning human hair into jewelry and wreaths was a popular craft during the period, a way for families to honor and remember their dear departed. And an "experienced" young widow, dressed fashionably in black, could be quite a catch as a wife, especially if she had money. Come and see.

MY EARLY YEARS WORKING FOR THE TOWN

My dad was the Tree Warden in town for over twenty five years and I started out working with him when I was around fourteen. My job back then was walking down the roads painting Gypsy Moth eggs in the trees with creosol. We used a brush on a long pole to reach as high as we could and cover the eggs and destroy them. I also at times, helped him cutting trees up with the cross cut saw as the town did not own any chain saws back then. It was a little different working with the cross cut. There was one person on each end and when the guy on the other end pulled the saw through to his side you had to pull it back. When I slowed down or wasn't pulling my side, Dad would tell me that I was riding the saw.

I worked with Dad all during the time that he held the job either after school or on my days off after I started a job with Sears Roebuck. He taught me a lot about cutting a tree and landing it where you wanted it to land. He was very good at it probably from being a logger in his younger days and of course, like many young boys, I got to where I knew it all. Well, we took down a good size Elm on Wellington Road one day and I told him where I thought it would land. Dad did not agree with me but I guess he figured it was time to teach me a lesson as I wasn't about to give in. He handed me the saw and said cut it. I notched it toward where I wanted to land and started cutting. Well, I was close but not close enough. I took out about fifteen feet of Mr. Trudell's picket fence and spent the next few days or evenings replacing and painting the fence for free.

After Dad gave up the job, I got elected for the position and held it for eight years before giving it up. It was a very interesting job and I can say that I had a good teacher. Before I got through, I started a program where we would go to a nursery and purchase the trees that they had left in the fall and give them to home owners with the stipulation that they had to be planted with in fifteen feet of the road. There were several varieties and it was a good way to replace trees and getting the home owner to care for them. There are many trees in this town that I can, I PUT THAT TREE THERE WITH MY DAD.
