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### "A moment in time"

### Advertising Curtain (See previous page for photo)

This month I will be talking about the advertising curtain that was discovered on the back of the stage upstairs in the Grange Hall. I do not know when the curtain was made up but my guess is that it goes back at least to the 1930s if not older. The curtain shows advertisements from businesses, who I assume paid to have their ad painted on the curtain. I will attempt to describe them and tell what I know or remember about them starting from the left.

The first one on the upper left, **Nyman & Nyman** did painting and wall papering. One of the owners, Oscar Nyman was also a member of the fire department and served on the committee for the Templeton Center School when it was built in 1941. I have been told that he fell to his death while doing a job in Fitchburg. Next is **E.R. Robillard's Pharmacy** that was located on Parker Street in Gardner. **Woods Garage** was located at the intersection of Summer St. and Chelsea St. in South Gardner. They were a car dealership that sold Plymouths and operated an ambulance service. The ambulance service still exists today.

The next two are **Chairtown Lumber** and **Royal Steam Heater Company** who are still doing business at the locations today. The **William P. Hawley Insurance Company** was located in Baldwinville. Mr. Hawley resided on Pleasant Street. The **Templeton Light Department** was as we know it today except that they also operated a store on Central Street and sold electrical appliances. **Farm Service Stores** I know nothing about but wonder if they might have been the Farmers' Cooperative. **Rod's Electric** specialized in automotive electric rebuilding starters etc. They were located in Gardner and owned by the Rod brothers who lived in town.

**Wirthmore Feeds and Coal** was located on Main Street in Gardner. My dad used to buy grain from them. I can remember during the war how the grain came in sacks made of cotton fabric and my mother would use it to make aprons and such. The building was later known as Manca's Warehouse and was destroyed by a fire years ago.

The first National Bank was located just up from the Colonial Hotel. The empty building still stands but I do not think it is being used. The bank changed owners several times and is now T.D.North on Pearson Blvd. Next is Ki's Beauty Shoppe which was owned and operated by Karen Holmbo on Main Street in East Templeton. Next is Templeton Garage which was owned and operated by Karen's father, Jack Holmbo. The garage was later sold to Tovio Huhtala and is owned by his grandsons, the third generation. The Holmbo family lived right next to the garage. They purchased the octagon house on the corner of Mechanic Street and started a chicken farm. The garage was taken by the state when Route 2 was constructed and is still there in ruins. The house was moved to a location on Barre Road and is still in use today. The W. E. Aubuchon Co. was located in West Gardner. The company relocated a few times and is now located on Pearson Blvd. The Plain View Bakery, was located on Central Street and the American House was at 38 parker Street, both in Gardner. The Butterfly Beauty Shoppe was at 20 Parker Street. Lemas Furniture Co. was at 76 Parker St. There are several others from Gardner that I know very little about. I also am not familiar with Smith Brothers Heating Oil in Baldwinville.

**Lovell's Garage** was owned and operated by Perley Lovell and is now operated by C.O. & S in East Templeton. Many people think the garage was in Templeton Center but they are mistaken. Perley's brother Clarence operated the garage in the center.

**F.E. Johnson and Son** is now the Templeton Country Store. The cover of our book shows Mr. Johnson standing in front with two others. The next one that I remember is **George Lebroke Grocery and Meats**. This was the Clover Farm Store that was in the center located in what is now Nygard's Animal Hospital. Then there is **Twin Dairy Farm** which was in Petersham, owned and operated by the Elliott family I remember them going to the houses and walking in and putting the milk in the refrigerator for the customer, something that you would not do today.

The **Hatton Press Printers** was located in Gardner. Their shop is now the location of the Stasukelis Appliance Store. **Parkers Auto Sales** is now Parkers Autobody on Willow Street and **Wheelen Inc**. is now Wheelen Supply in Gardner still in business today.
